DECLASSIFICATION REVIEW PURSUANT TO EXECUTIVE ORDER 14040

March 29, 2022

Today, in carrying out Executive Order 14040, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) released additional documents from the FBI's investigation of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks and other investigations that are responsive to sections 2(b), 2(c), and 2(d) of the Executive Order. With today's release, the U.S. Government has now declassified and released more than 900 documents, totaling almost 4,000 pages, in furtherance of the Executive Order's directive to maximize transparency.

Over the past four weeks, the FBI has updated more than 70 documents that were previously released on November 2 and December 30, 2021, lifting further redactions. Today's release and the releases on March 15, 18, and 23, 2022, reflect those updates. These updated versions include the results of the U.S. Government's coordination with over two dozen foreign governments. Many of these documents also include passages containing analysis of banking, financial, credit, communication, business, or education records that were or may have been obtained pursuant to grand jury subpoena. This information could not be released prior to receiving court authorization, which was granted in two separate orders on March 2 and 22, 2022.

This release note also updates the information contained in prior release notes to accurately reflect, as of today, the number of documents that remain withheld in full and the reason for each withholding. Specifically, the following release notes detailed that the FBI had identified a total of 44 documents that were withheld from public disclosure under redaction code C-1, for "INFORMATION OBTAINED FROM FOREIGN GOVERNMENT(S) AND WITHHELD AT THE DIRECTION OF ANOTHER U.S. GOVERNMENT AGENCY OR DEPARTMENT PENDING ONGOING CONSULTATION":

Following the required consultations, the FBI has released a subset of these documents. Currently, there are 33 documents that remain withheld under the C-1 redaction code. This includes 8 documents responsive to Section 2(b) and 25 documents responsive to Section 2(c).
